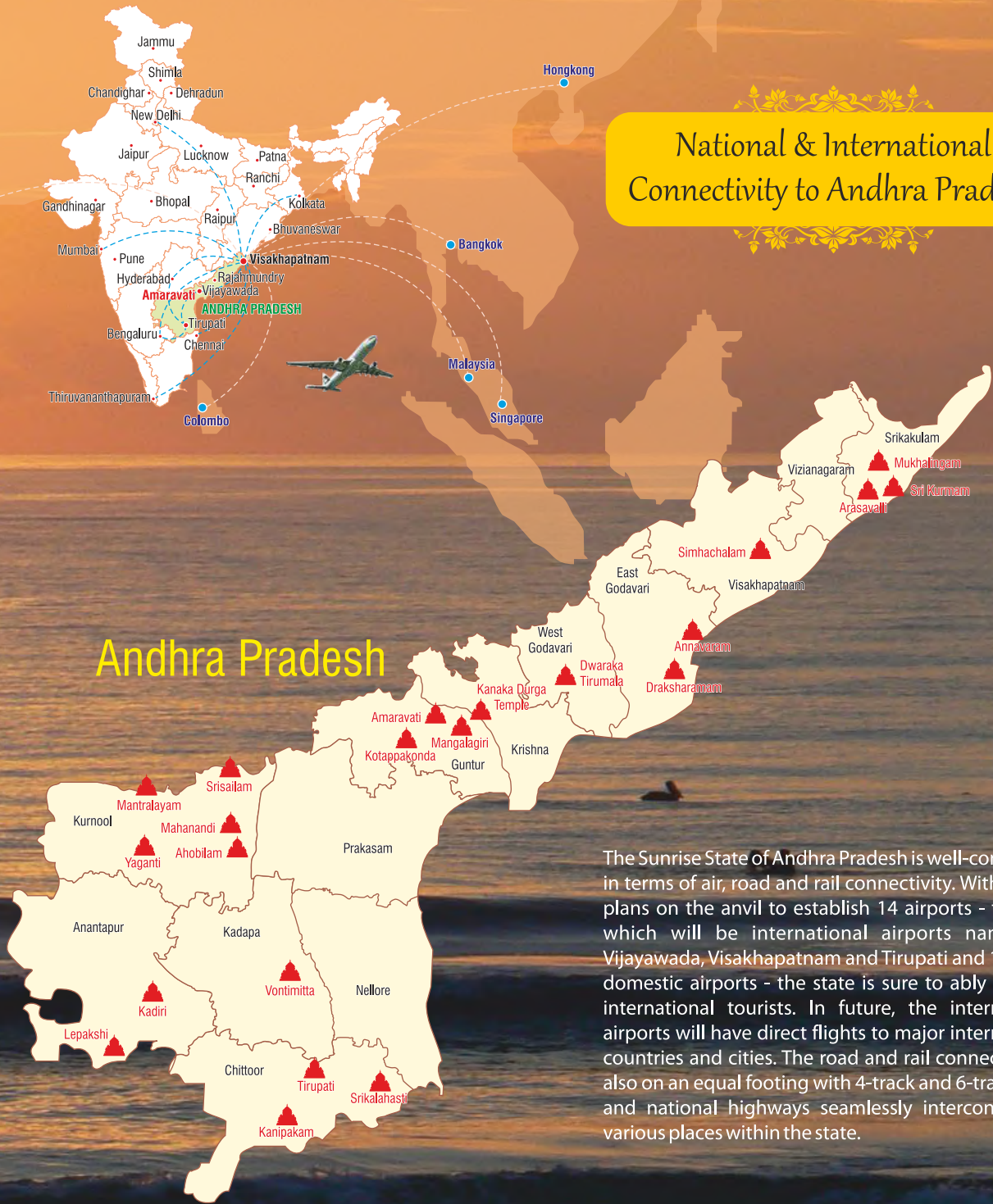

Temples of Andhra Pradesh



Welcome to the fascinating state of south India - Andhra Pradesh. A land of world-renowned temples that are steeped in rich cultural and traditional beauty. Some of these shrines hold fascinating histories that date back to thousands of years. Each temple has religious significance intertwined with historical facts.

Andhra Pradesh holds the distinction of being the sacred ground for the Pancharamam temples where the five fragments of the Shiva Lingam are worshipped. It is the privileged home for the deities that are unique and rare like the Sun God (Suryanarayana Temple in Arasavalli) and the Turtle Avatar of Lord Vishnu (Sri Kurmam). This is also the land of Tirumala Balaji. A deity whose temple has more footfalls than even the Vatican and is the richest temple in the world.

The land of temples beckons you to experience the fervour of devotees, to witness this splendour of its holy shrines and to embark on a spiritual journey that will forever remain a profound memory...

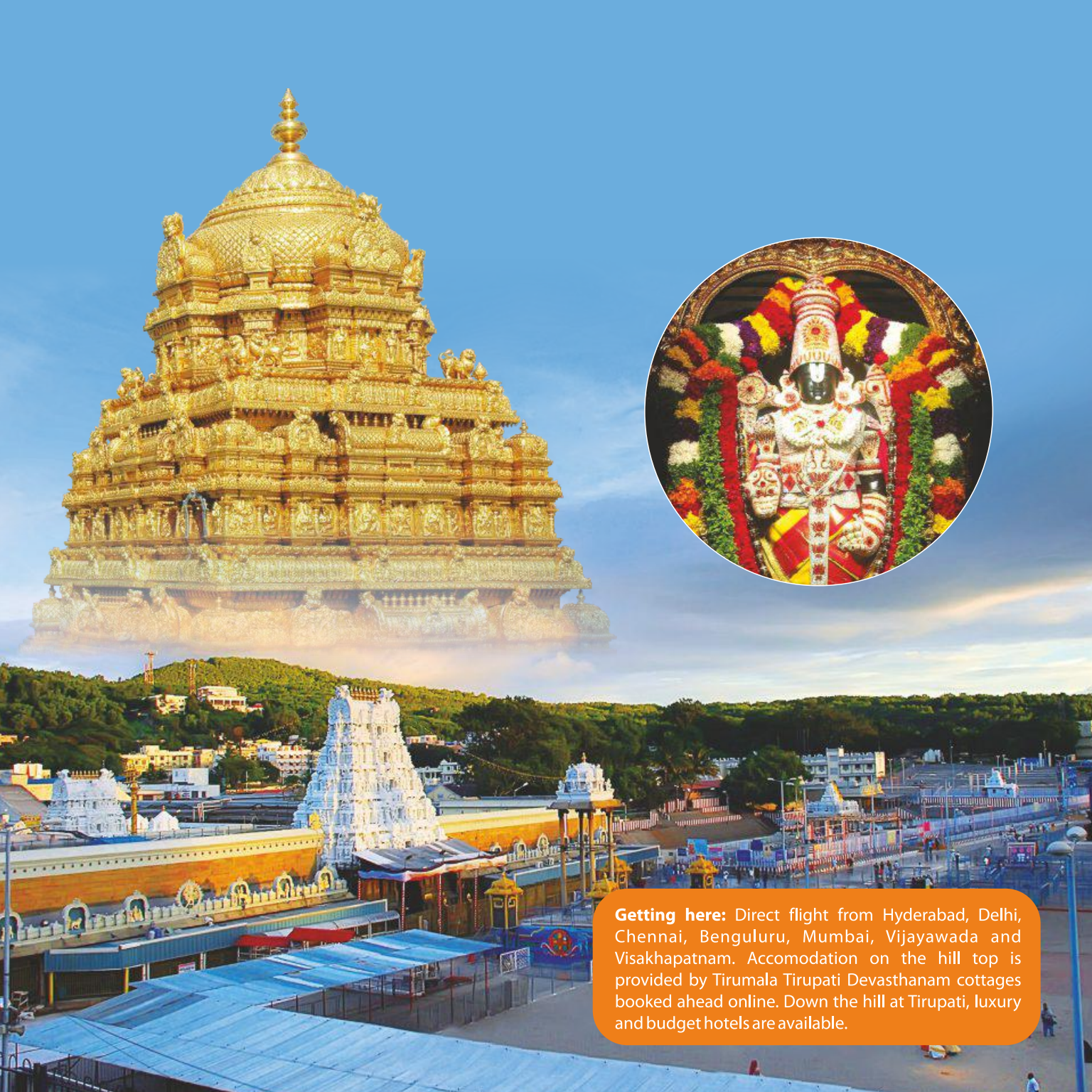


Sri Venkateswara Swamy Temple

Tirumala-Tirupati, Chittoor District

There are often no words or indeed a need to describe Lord Venkateswara temple on Tirumala Hills near Tirupati in Chittoor district, Andhra Pradesh. Suffice to say, it is the richest and the single most visited temple in the world. You are overwhelmed, thrilled, breathless and awestruck at the look of the Moolaviraat. Bejewelled in diamonds, Lord Venkateswara is a sight to behold. Standing an imposing ten feet in black stone, Lord Venkateswara will seem to speak to your senses personally even with the teeming devotees around you. They say you can only go to Tirumala if the Lord wishes it. Don't forget to make a wish in your eagerness to keep looking at the deity. The Dasara Brahmotsavam is celebrated with huge aplomb as lakhs of devotees throng the streets of Tirumala every day. The Akasa Ganga, Sila Thoranam, Kanipakam, Kapila Theertham, Sreevari paadalu, Chandragiri fort, Alivelu Mangapuram are other major attractions nearby.





Getting here: Direct flight from Hyderabad, Delhi, Chennai, Bengaluru, Mumbai, Vijayawada and Visakhapatnam. Accomodation on the hill top is provided by Tirumala Tirupati Devasthanam cottages booked ahead online. Down the hill at Tirupati, luxury and budget hotels are available.

Sri Kalahasthiswara Swamy Temple

Sri Kalahasti, Chittoor District

Legend goes that once upon a time, a spider wove a web on a Shiva lingam to protect it from rain and sun. A snake offered a gem in prayer and an elephant performed abhishekam on the Lingam. But when the three came together, it was a blood bath. Moved by their blind devotion, Lord Shiva granted them life and Sri the Spider, Kala the Snake and Hasti the elephant were immortalised in this temple near Tirupati. Travel to this small town 35 km from Tirupati and a unique Srikalahastishwara greets you. Here you will find the Vayulinga, one of the five elemental Lingams of Shiva. The white Lingam is said to be self-manifested and has not been touched by human hand. When you visit, look for the flickering lamps near the main shrine. Even with all doors closed a soft breeze seems to come from the Vayulingam that blows over the lamps. The temple is famous for Rahu Ketu Puja that helps in ridding you of any misfortunes. This is the only temple that is open during an eclipse.

Getting here: 35 km from Tirupati town.
Taxis and bus service available from Tirupati.





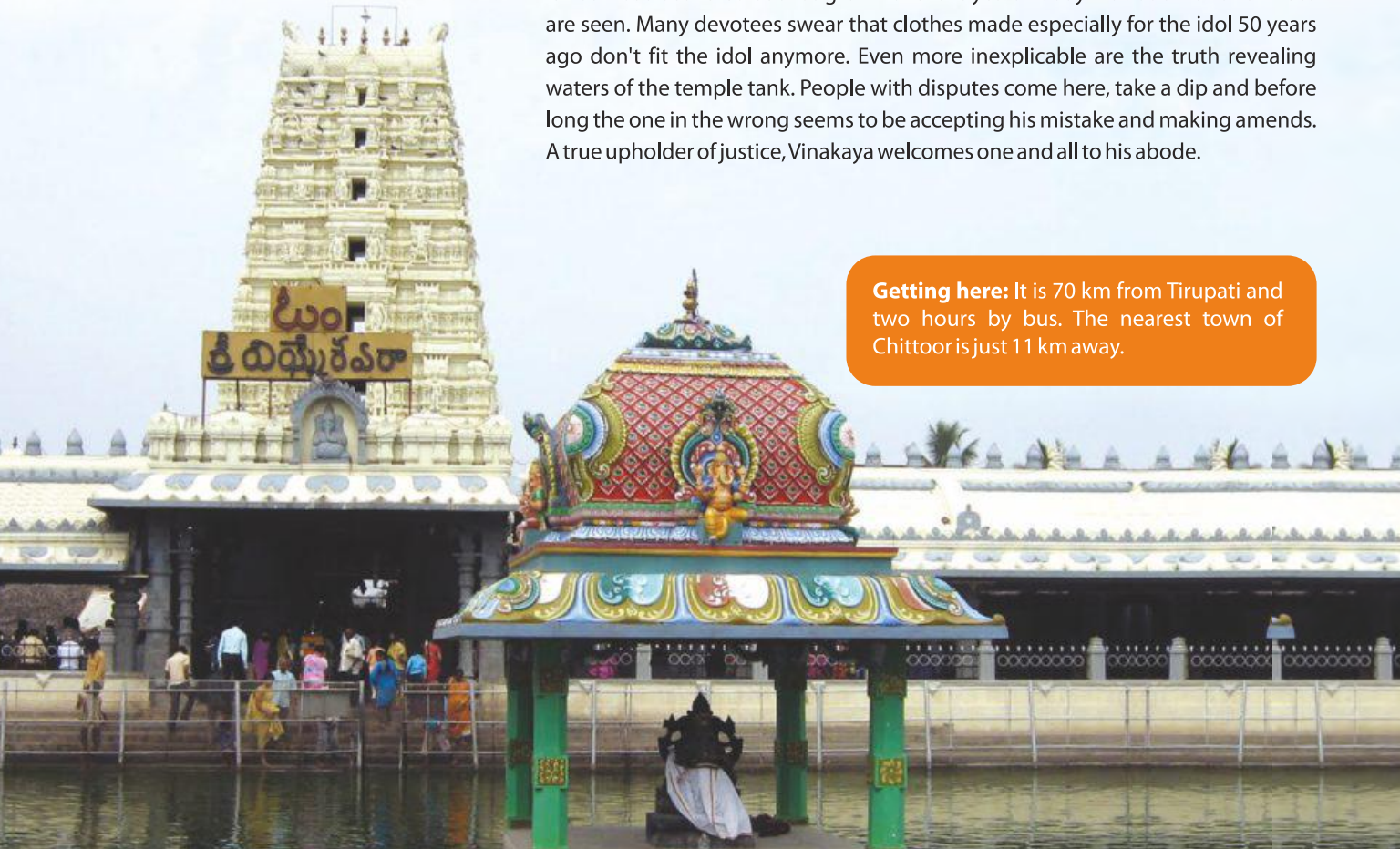
Sri Varasiddhi Vinayaka Temple

Kanipakam, Chittoor District



A temple where you cannot help but tell the truth. A temple where any clothes offered to the deity may not fit Him as He grows! A temple where God resides in a well and springs eternal. If you have never heard or visited this wonder, it is time you made a trip to Andhra. At Kanipakam, the Varasiddhi Vinayaka Swamy is believed to have self-manifested. The idol of the Vinayaka still lies in the well where it was first discovered but has grown over the years. Today His abdomen and knees are seen. Many devotees swear that clothes made especially for the idol 50 years ago don't fit the idol anymore. Even more inexplicable are the truth revealing waters of the temple tank. People with disputes come here, take a dip and before long the one in the wrong seems to be accepting his mistake and making amends. A true upholder of justice, Vinakaya welcomes one and all to his abode.


Getting here: It is 70 km from Tirupati and two hours by bus. The nearest town of Chittoor is just 11 km away.





Sri Kodandarama Swamy Temple

Vontimettu, Kadapa



It is a name that is said to bring you peace at your worst possible moments. A name that inspires strength and confidence to get over any peril. It is one of the most beloved Gods in Hindu mythology- Lord Rama. Such is the power of devotion that the Kondandarama Swamy temple at Kadapa is believed to have been built by two robbers who turned to stone and became eternal devotees after dedicating the temple to their god. Come to Vontimettu to see Rama worshipped in all His glory. The statues of Rama with Sita and Lakshmana are said to be carved from a single stone whereas Rama's most ardent devotee Hanuman has another temple in the premises. The birth of Rama or the Sriramanavami festival is celebrated with huge aplomb in this temple by the state government.

Getting here: The Vontimettu temple is located 25 km from Kadapa town which provides good accommodation at the tourism department run Harita hotel. The Airport at Kadapa is currently operating flights to Bengaluru.

Sri Lakshmi Narasimha Swamy Temple

Kadiri, Anantapuramu District



Picture this - Eight handed Lion God, Lord Narasimha cleaving the demon Hiranyakashyapa and then transforming into a serene deity to offer solace to the devout Prahalada. The Ashta Bahu Lakshmi Narasimha Swamy idol tells the whole story in one temple visit. The significance of the temple lies in the place it is located. Kadiri which is derived from the Sanskrit Khadri meaning canary wood tree is believed to be the tree from which Lord Narasimha Swamy emerged at this place eons ago. The temple itself dates back to the 16th century.

Getting here: At 92 km from Anantapur, it is off the beaten track and a little distance from a proper town but the temple complex has much to offer, so take time out and visit.

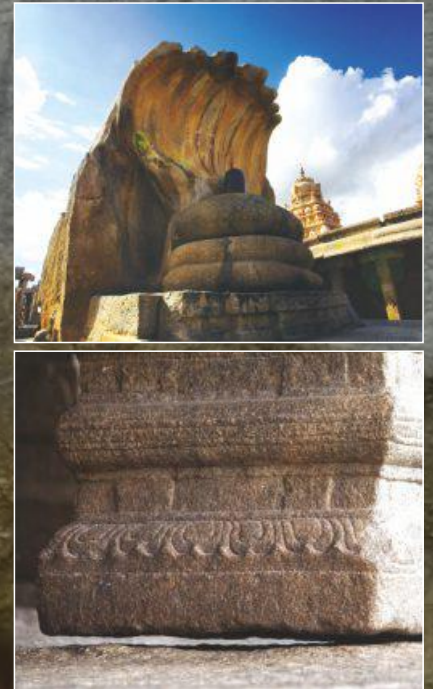


Sri Veerabhadra Swamy Temple
Lepakshi, Anantapuramu District



There are very few who cannot bring to mind a picture of the Nandi when we say Lepakshi. Such is the power of association. And if there is a Nandi, it is guarding a Shiva Lingam. In this case the Veerabhadra manifestation of Lord Shiva. Located 200 metres from the temple, India's biggest monolithic granite bull faces the Shiva Lingam which is protected by a magnificently hooded stone serpent. The experience of visiting Lepakshi is as mystifying as the legend surrounding its name. Some say it was where Jatayu fell trying to save Sita from Ravana. Rama asking him to get up (Le Pakshi- Get up Bird) gave the place its name. Another tale is that of the royal treasurer who commissioned the construction of this massive structure. Accused of embezzlement, he blinded himself and threw his eyes at the under construction temple walls and so it is called the village of a blinded eye or Lepakshi. The temple exemplifies the effort rulers of yore, especially of the Vijayanagara Empire, put into serving their Gods. Sculptures, paintings, intricate carvings fill up the walls, roof and pillars. Architectural wonders like hanging pillar that just skim the surface of the ground and huge 100 pillared dance hall all seem to be fringe benefits for the presiding deity.

Getting here: Lepakshi is a detour on the Bengaluru-Anantapur highway. Anantapur is 3 hours by road from Bengaluru and offers good accommodation facilities.





Sri Mahanandiswara Swamy Temple

Mahanandi, Kurnool District



Lord Shiva's vehicle Nandi is worshipped in the Mahanandiswara Temple at Kurnool. There are nine Nandi shrines around the temple that give the Nandi its due place in the hearts of the people. A Sri Chakra outside the main shrine is believed to be set up by Adi Shankara. Then there is the Pushkarini. The water here is crystal clear. Try dropping a coin and you can see it at the bottom of the pool. The water for these pools come from the tank below the main shrine and is believed to carry mystical powers. The water is hot in winter months and cool in summer months, so rest assured that whenever you go, you will get to wonder at the quirks of nature.



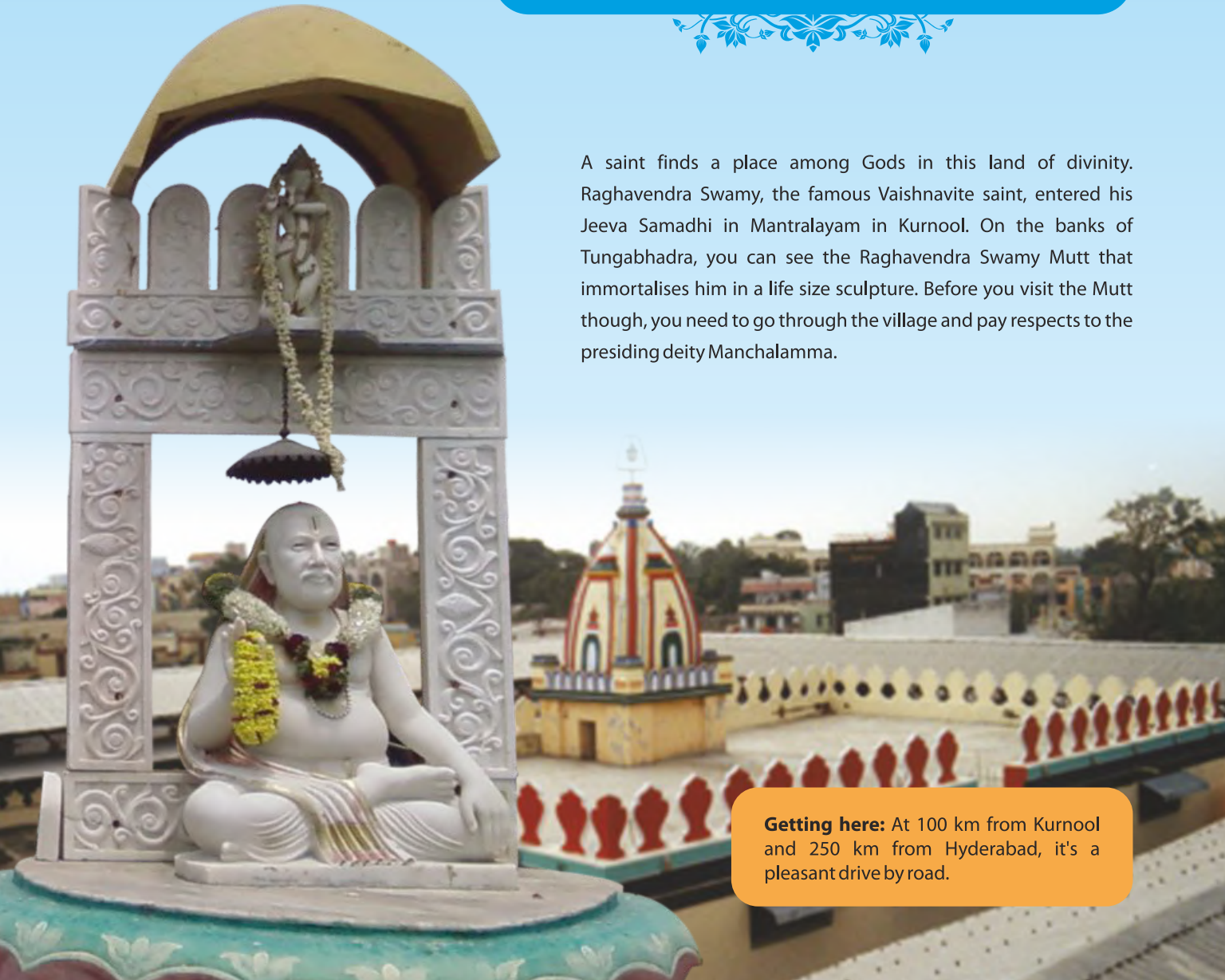
Getting here: The temple is 92 km from Kurnool town. The nearest airport is Hyderabad, which is 3 hours drive. Kurnool town offers good accommodation for stay and travel.



Sri Raghavendra Swamy Mutt Mantralayam, Kurnool District



A saint finds a place among Gods in this land of divinity. Raghavendra Swamy, the famous Vaishnavite saint, entered his Jeeva Samadhi in Mantralayam in Kurnool. On the banks of Tungabhadra, you can see the Raghavendra Swamy Mutt that immortalises him in a life size sculpture. Before you visit the Mutt though, you need to go through the village and pay respects to the presiding deity Manchalamma.



Getting here: At 100 km from Kurnool and 250 km from Hyderabad, it's a pleasant drive by road.



Sri Nava Narasimha Swamy Temples
Ahobilam , Kurnool District





Lion headed and roaring, He burst out of a pillar to vanquish the demon Hiranyakashyapa and save Prahalada. The gods screamed Ahobala (great strength). The action packed Aavatar of Lord Vishnu gets a befitting abode in Ahobilam. Nestled deep within the dense forests of Nallamalla in Kurnool, the Lower and Upper Ahobilam are home to Lord Narasimha Swamy in his nine incarnations. We know Him in his fiercest form of Ugra Narasimha but this was only in the beginning of the Avatar. The nine shrines located in the far reaches of the forested hills tell you the whole story where Narasimha Swamy is teaching yoga to Prahalada, affably consorting with Chenchulakshmi, even meditating under Karanja tree. Long treks across the lower and upper Ahobilam give you a sense of purpose. They are time away from reality and at the same time a spiritual quest. Don't miss the Ugra Sthambham or the Ukku Sthambab where Lord Narasimha appeared at the behest of Prahalada. The world renowned Ahobilam Math is also headquartered here.

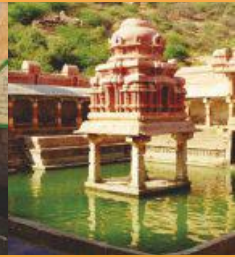
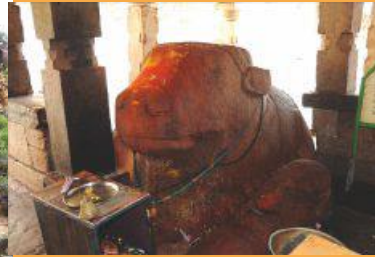
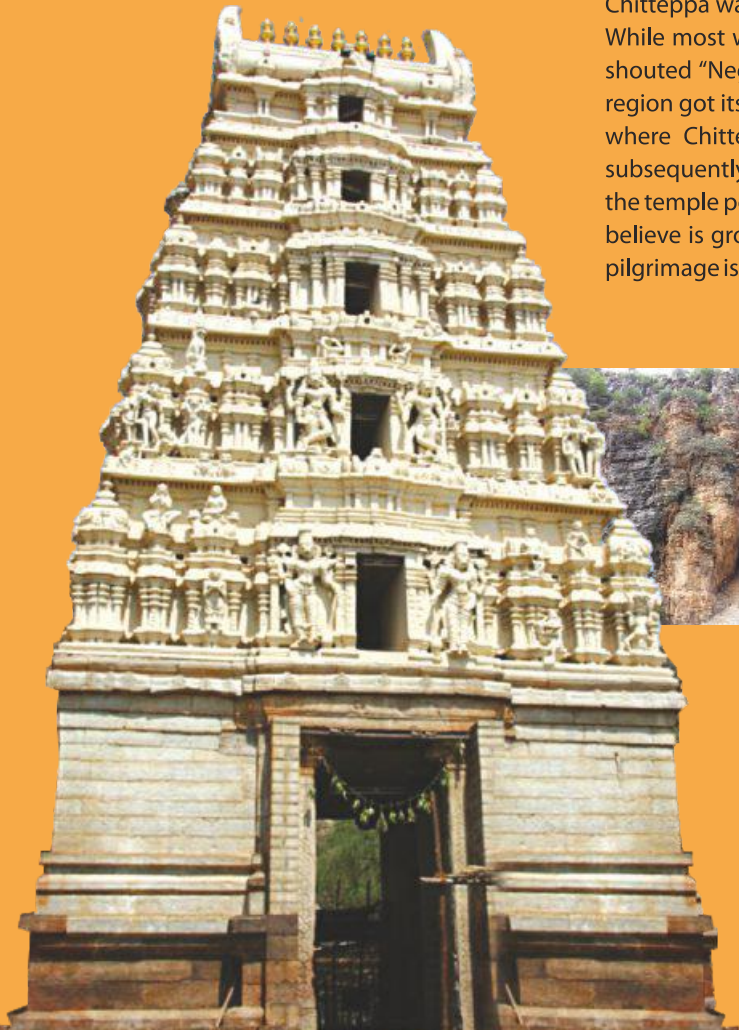
Getting here: Located 136 km from Kurnool town, its nearest railway station is Nandyala. Can also drive down from Hyderabad airport about 250 km (3 hours drive) away. Accommodations are available in the location but you can stay in Kurnool and travel here.



Sri Yagantiswara Swamy Temple

Yaganti, Kurnool District

There is a lot of truth to the saying that God tests your devotion. A devout Chitteppa was praying to Lord Shiva, when a tiger appeared in front of him. While most would run for cover, Chitteppa looked the tiger in the eye and shouted "Neganti Shivunni" or I Saw Shiva. It is from this phrase that this region got its name and even today there is a cave outside the Shiva temple where Chitteppa is believed to have meditated. The temple was built subsequently. But the magic of the place is in its Pushkarini. Water flows into the temple pond from the hillside through the mouth of a Nandi which many believe is growing in size. Get the blessings of this miracle Nandi and your pilgrimage is complete.



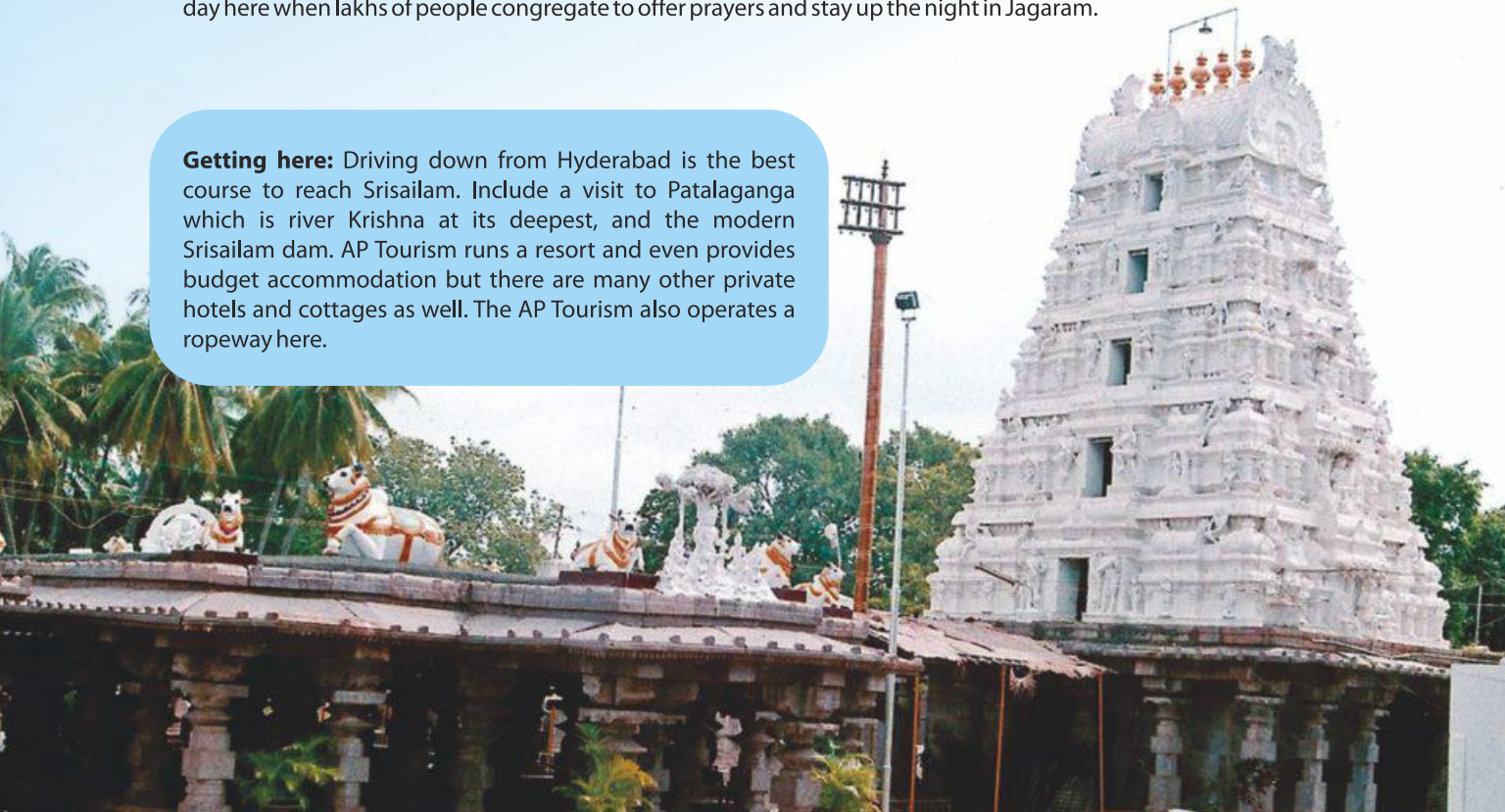
Getting here: Kurnool town is just 200 km from the international airport at Hyderabad and provides good hotels for stay while you travel by road to the temple.

Sri Mallikarjuna Swamy Temple

Srisailam, Kurnool District

A temple where you can touch your God. The beauty of this temple lies not in the picturesque location in the middle of the Nallamalla forests, but in the largesse of the Lord Mallikarjuna who gives you a personal audience. If you so choose lets you touch the lingam with your head as well. It is the only temple of its kind to allow such access. But then Lord Mallikarjuna always loved his devotees. The Chenchu tribe fondly call him Mallanna. Every Hindu king in his time patronised the temple- from Krishnadevaraya of Vijayagaram to the Kakatiyas of Warangal to even the Maratha King Chatrapati Shivaji. As one of the 12 Jyotirlingas, it is one of the most significant holy places in the country. It is also a Mahashaktipeetham as Bramaramba Devi resides here. Mahashivaratri is the most important day here when lakhs of people congregate to offer prayers and stay up the night in Jagaram.

Getting here: Driving down from Hyderabad is the best course to reach Srisailam. Include a visit to Patalaganga which is river Krishna at its deepest, and the modern Srisailam dam. AP Tourism runs a resort and even provides budget accommodation but there are many other private hotels and cottages as well. The AP Tourism also operates a ropeway here.

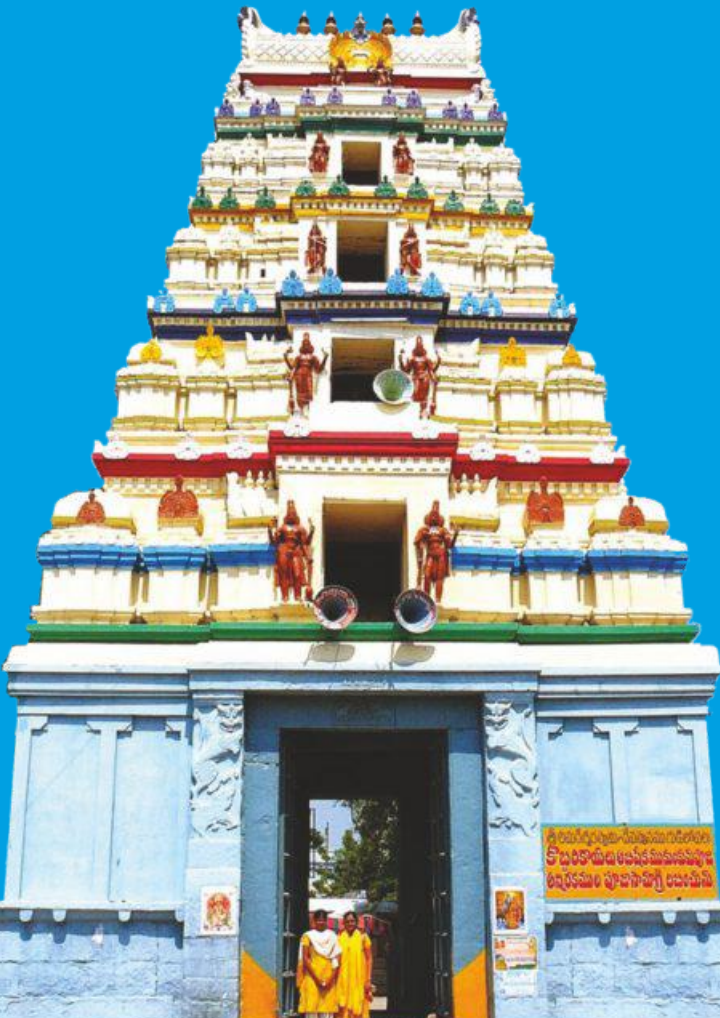


Sri Amareswara Swamy Temple

Amaravati , Guntur District

A Shiva temple where a Lingam carved out of the unique Palnadu stone is worshipped. The 15 feet Lingam is white in colour and the priests actually worship it from the first floor of the temple. The temple itself is located on the banks of river Krishna. With the almighty Amareswara residing next to the sacred river, Amaravati is considered one of the most pious places to visit. Add to it the fact that the Lord's consort here is Bala Chamundika who is said to be the fourth among the 18 main Goddesses.

Getting here: The big towns of Vijayawada and Guntur are about 40 km away making it an ideal one day travel destination



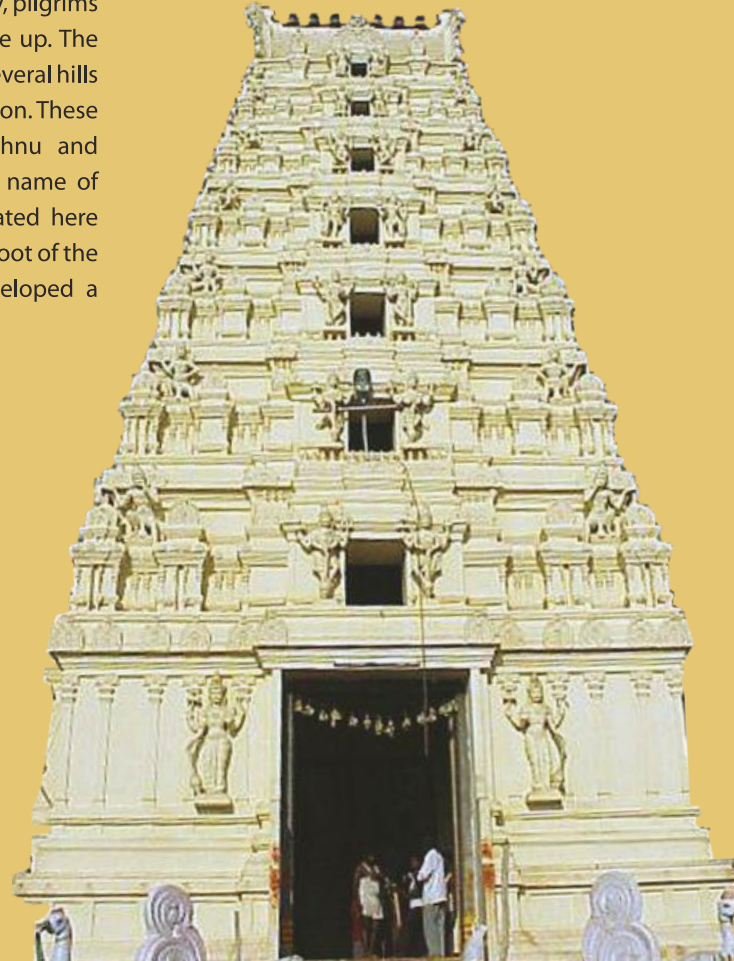
Sri Trikooteswara Swamy Temple

Kotappakonda, Guntur District

Visiting temples may be cleansing to the soul, but many Gods make you work hard to reach their earthly abodes. In this case the Shiva Lingam is located at a height of 1587 feet at Kotapakonda. Until recently, pilgrims would walk a steep pathway but now a ghat road has come up. The three peaks that make this hill are so distinctive that despite several hills surrounding them, all three are clearly visible from any direction. These peaks are named after the holy trinity of Brahma, Vishnu and Maheswara. It is this trio of peaks that gave the deity its name of Trikooteswara. Mahashivratri is the biggest festival celebrated here where the entire village comes to life and a fest is held at the foot of the hills. The tourism and endowments department also developed a dinosaur park for kids here.



Getting here: It is 57 km from Guntur. Tourism department accommodation is available at the temple including VIP suits.



Sri Paanakala (Narasimha) Swamy Temple

Mangalagiri, Guntur District

If it is your ardent wish that God consumes your offering, come to Mangalagiri. On this Holy Hill, Lord Narasimha Swamy will actually drink up the Panakam you offer. About 13 km from Vijayawada, is Mangalagiri town which has three Narasimha Swamy temples. But it is the Panakam drinking deity on the hillock who is the centre of attraction. You can buy Panakam Chembu or jaggary water glass at the temple and go directly to the main temple where the priest will pour the water into the open mouth of the Narasimha idol. The water disappears down His throat giving you immense satisfaction. The sweet water is meant to cool down the ferocious Narasimha avatar of Lord Vishnu. And such is His charm that you will not find a single ant or fly hovering around to gobble up any spilled Panakam. Come and see for yourself.



Getting here: Stay in Vijayawada and drive down to Mangalagiri. It is a day trip that can end in you picking up the famous Mangalagiri cottons.



Goddess Durga Malleswari Temple / Kanakanaka Durga Temple Vijayawada, Krishna District



An enchanting turmeric smeared face that looks fresh anytime of the day. A smiling Goddess who encourages devotion and a fantastic hill top temple on the banks of river Krishna make the Kanaka Durga temple of Vijayawada a must see. Some say she was an innocent misunderstood girl killed by her brothers whose soul rose to reside on the Indrakiladri hill as Durga Malleshwari Devi. Legend has it that when a king ordered the death of his own son for negligently causing the death of a boy, a pleased Durga granted life to both the prince and his victim. On seeing this, Lord Mallikarjuna rained gold and hence she came to be known as Kanaka Durga or Golden Durga. While Dasara is the most auspicious time here, if you can make a trip in July, the temple and the deity are decorated in tonnes of fruit and vegetable as part of Shaakambhari Utsavalu where nature's bounty make the best jewellery and garlands.


Getting here: Vijayawada Airport in the capital region has flights connecting to various Indian cities. Many star hotels including AP tourism Hotels are available for stay.



Sri Venkateswara Swamy Temple
Dwaraka Tirumala, West Godavari District



It is a Lord Venkateswara Temple just like Tirumala. The idol is also self-manifested just like in Tirumala. The abode is a serene vegetation just like Tirupati. Little wonder the Dwaraka Tirumala temple is called Chinna or mini Tirupati. Named after saint Dwaraka who found the Lord's idol after a long penance, it is as popular in the AP state as Tirumala is all over the world. The peace and tranquillity of the temple campus belie the fact that the temple is quite close to civilization.



Getting here: At 42 km from Eluru, the nearest airport of Vijayawada is a few hours away.



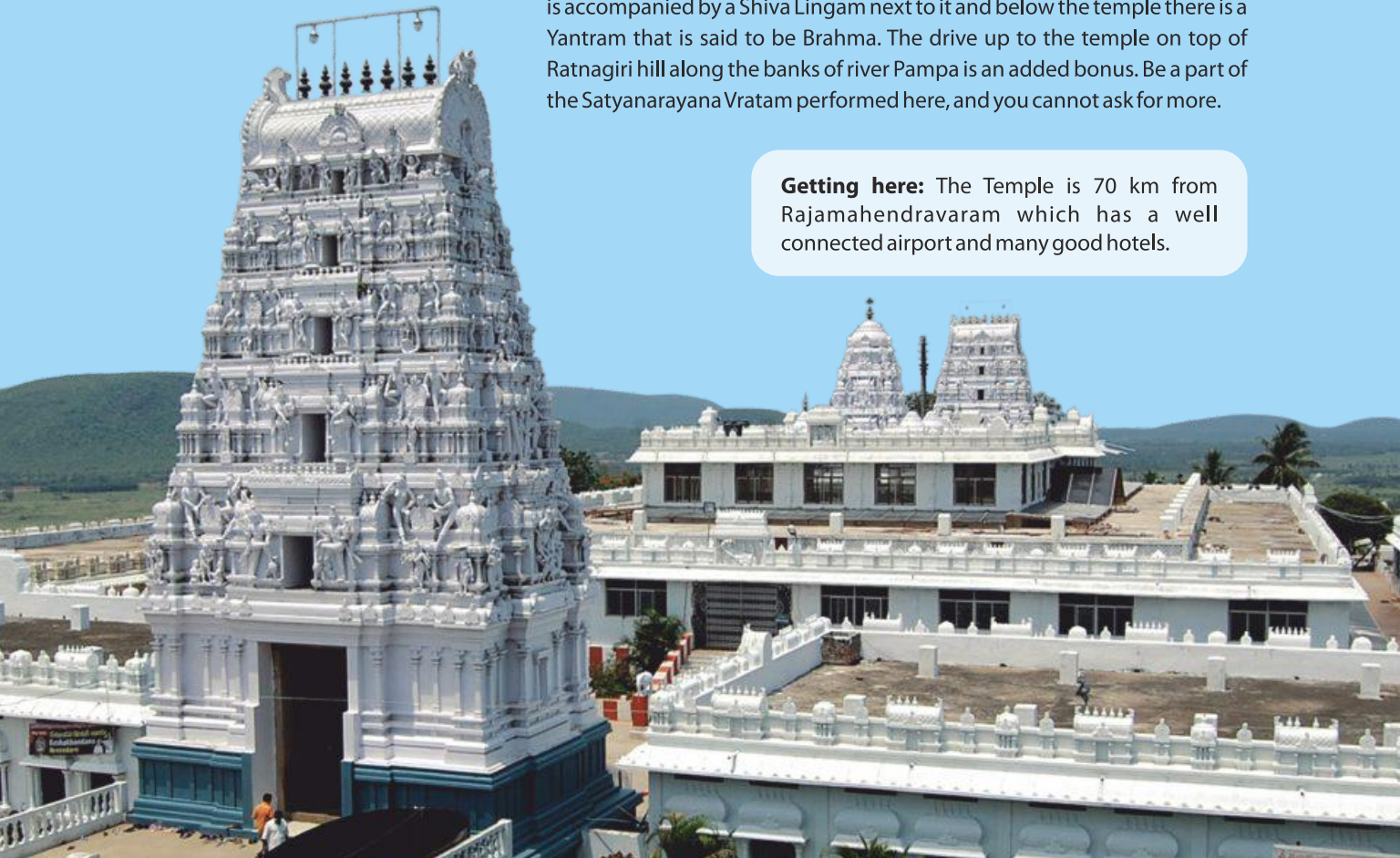
Sri Satyanarayana Swamy Temple

Annaram, East Godavari District



No wedding or Gruhapravesam is complete without the Satyanarayana Swamy Vratam. When you invoke Satyanarayana Swamy, your heart's wish is fulfilled. This boon granting Satyanarayana Swamy resides in the Annaram temple. In fact a visit here is a package deal – you get to see the Holy Trinity. This manifestation of Lord Vishnu in the form of Satyanarayana is accompanied by a Shiva Lingam next to it and below the temple there is a Yantram that is said to be Brahma. The drive up to the temple on top of Ratnagiri hill along the banks of river Pampa is an added bonus. Be a part of the Satyanarayana Vratam performed here, and you cannot ask for more.

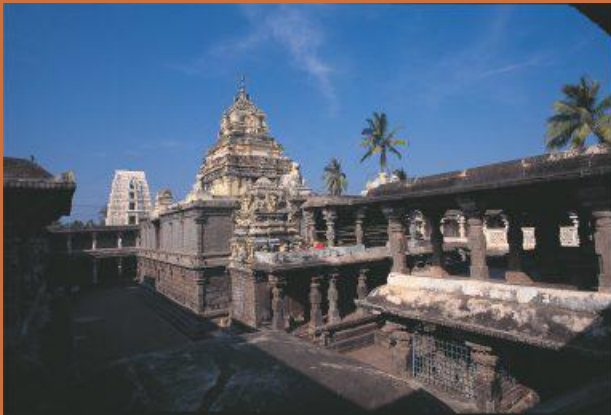
Getting here: The Temple is 70 km from Rajamahendravaram which has a well connected airport and many good hotels.



Sri Bhimeswara Swamy Temple

Draksharamam, East Godavari District

A temple steeped in legend. A Pancharama because a part of the Shiva's Atma Lingam fell here. A Shaktipeetham because the left cheek of Sati was flung here - you cannot find a more sacred place next to Kashi. Draksharamam lives up to its name of Dakshin Kashi. Lord Shiva is manifested here as Bhimeswara Swamy and his Lingam is said to be a Linga Stupa 2.6 meters high. Here the goddess takes the form of Manikyamba. Yet the temple is a modest structure belying the powerful divine presence you are bound to feel here.



Getting here: It is 20 km from Kakinada and 40 km from Rajamahendravaram which are well-connected by air.



Sri Varaha Narasimha Swamy Temple

Simhachalam, Visakhapatnam District

A temple that soothes the anger of Lord Narasimha Swamy can be found in Simhachalam near Visakhapatnam. The Lion God here is exquisite to say the least. The temple lies nestled amidst the Eastern Ghats. Like most temples in the state, this too is on a hill but the climb is short and pleasant. It feels like you have stepped back in time when you enter the all-stone interior of the temple. Long and wide stone pillars pave way to the inner sanctum where Narasimha Swamy awaits in his golden glory. The idol of the Varaha Narasimha Swamy is always covered in a thick paste of sandalwood ostentatiously to cool this angry Avatar of Lord Vishnu.



The golden idol becomes incandescent when lit only by oil lamp and gives you a darshan that is unforgettable. The sandal paste is removed only once a year when devotees flood the temple with no room to spare.

Getting here: Visakhapatnam has an international airport. Simhachalam is just a few kilometres away from the main town. Luxury and budget accommodations are aplenty in Visakhapatnam.



Sri Suryanarayana Murthy Temple

Arasavalli, Srikakulam District

Vishnu is fond of name chanting. Shiva loves Abhishekam. And the Sun loves bowing in devotion. At the Arasavalli Surya temple, you can offer the Sun deity Surya Namaskaras. As the only temple for sun god in the state, this is the home of Suryanarayana Swamy seen here riding his seven horse chariot. In a unique tradition of the temple, you can wish for anything from wanting to get married to good health and offer the Sun his most loved form of reverence - the Namaskara. Book a session of Surya Namaskaras to be offered to the deity and the priests will perform the yogasana in your stead. It is inspiring to see even octogenarian priests bending and twisting their body in such devotion. Two times a year, the sunrays fall directly at the feet of the Surya idol making it one of the most sought after darshan among devotees.



Getting here: Arasavalli is just 3 kilometres from Srikakulam town which offers some modest accommodations. At just 100 km from Vizag, it is a one day drive and back if pressed for time.

Sri Kurmanadha Temple

Sri Kurmam, Srikakulam District

He took the form of a tortoise to balance Mount Mandara on his back during the churning of the milky ocean for nectar. Lord Vishnu's Kurmavatar is seldom seen except as part of the Dashavatar idols sold in wooden crafts shops. In fact there exists only one temple for the Kurmanadha in Andhra Pradesh. The temple has more religious significance. It is believed that in Kruta Yug, Sveta Maharaj's penance paid off and Lord Vishnu manifested his Kurmavatar in this temple. So impressed were the Gods that Brahma himself officiated the rituals and consecrated the shrine with Sudershana and Gopala Yantras. The Sudershana Chakra of Vishnu created the cleansing pond of Sveta Pushkarini here. Today, devotees come here for cure. A dip in the pond here seems to rejuvenate devotees as if all their illness is healed.



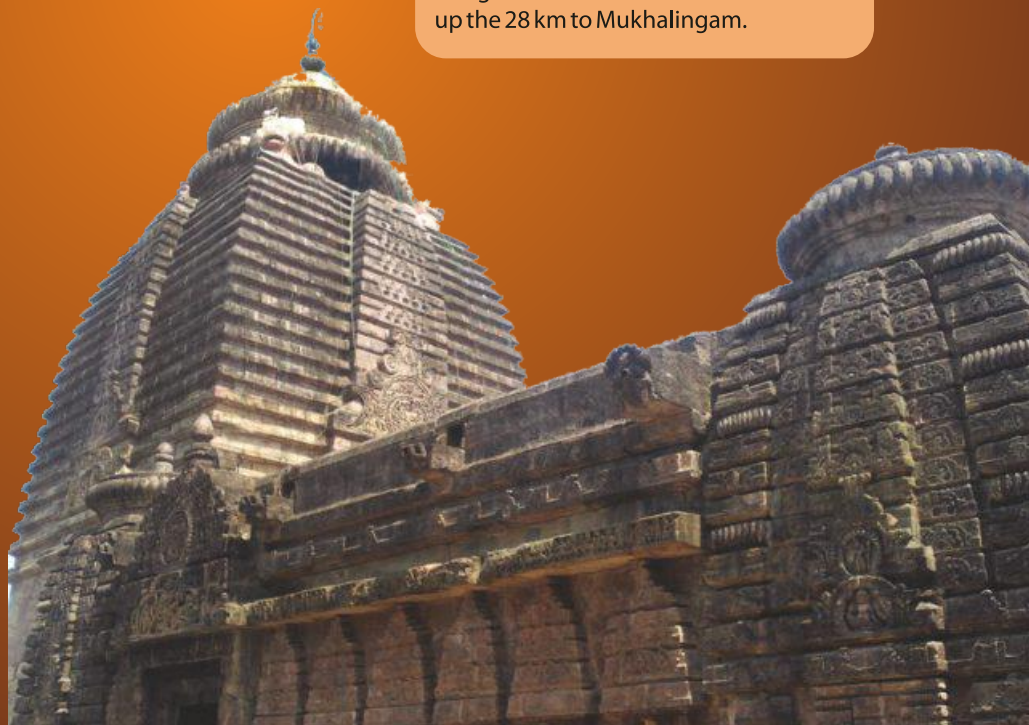
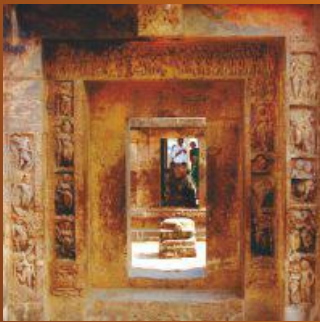
Getting here : Make the scenic drive along the Kalingapatam beach in Srikakulam for this temple. You can stay at the Kalingapatnam Beach Resort of Tourism Department or other hotels in Srikakulam.

Sri Madhukeswara Temple

Sri Mukhalingam, Srikakulam District

An architectural brilliance, the three temples of Shiva in this complex are a must see in the Srikakulam temple circuit. The temples are almost geometric in shape and the complex is a perfect square which has four temples on four corners with the main shrine in the centre. The Someswara Swamy temple is considered the oldest of these temples. Look for the arches and architecture where especially on the doorway you will find the carvings of Ganga and Yamuna rivers. The Madhukeswara temple at the centre has a huge entrance door flanked by two lions. A Nandi faces the main shrine. While a visit to the Shiva lingam may be accomplished shortly, spend some time exploring the craftsmanship of the period. Dated as far back as 941 AD the temple's sculptures and carvings have withstood the test of time to showcase the great talent of those days.

Getting here: Stay at any one of the budget hotels in Srikakulam and drive up the 28 km to Mukhalingam.
